Interim Head Teacher's Comment

This half term has certainly whizzed by exceptionally fast – I can't believe we are at half term already! It's been action packed and I feel firmly part of the TDS family thanks to the exceptionally warm welcome I have received from you and your children. Please read below to find out what we have been busy doing to further improve TDS this half term.

- Thanks to our school meals team we have changed the way that school meals are served to
 ensure that meals reach your child as a hot meal. I enjoy school dinners myself and have
 spent several lunch times in the dining room.
- ODBST and Bucks continue to meet with regards to the conversion and we hope to be able to announce a conversion date as soon as we have confirmation.
- I had a meeting with the IEB on Tuesday and shared our progress towards the action plan.
- The teaching team and I have reviewed the end of year report format. After discussions with staff we feel that the new report layout is informative and easy for parents to read. We have also been reviewing our marking and feedback policy and have developed a code that is easily understood by the children so that they can make improvements to their work.
- I have met with all staff members in an attempt to get to know them and ascertain what they deem to be the strengths and areas for development for TDS.
- I met with the Student Leadership Team who shared many exciting ideas. I hope to be able to assist them in delivering a few of their ideas next half term.
- A review of the science curriculum has begun and staff are engaged in conversations regarding developments that can be made.
- We have continued to focus on the teaching and learning of phonics, English and maths and have been observing the children learn in these subjects.
- The school uniform policy has been amended slightly and recently approved by the IEB. We would be keen to have your feedback on this policy before we consider its implementation for September 2023. - Our Coronation event was exceptionally well attended by the parenting community and it
 was lovely to see the community coming together to celebrate this momentous occasion I
 look forward to seeing the community come together for more events next half term.

 made to our Early Years provision was duly noted by her. We also met our new reception
 parents at our welcome meeting last night.

School Office Notices

Class Notes

Please can you ensure that emails regarding absence, late arrival or your child leaving School early are sent into the school Office. We will then pass your message onto the teacher. Thank you.

Absences

Reporting an Absence. If your child is absent from School, please ensure you report the absence to the school Office via the absence line every day of your child's absence. **Sickness and diarrhoea** - Your child is not permitted to return to School until they have been free of sickness/diarrhoea for 48 hours from the last episode, as per the Buckinghamshire County Council's policy.

Leave of Absence Applications

'Leave of Absence' application forms need to be completed for **all absences other than medical** if they are during school hours, excluding sickness, which is reported via the absence line. The school does not encourage holiday during term time and therefore will be unauthorised. Where possible, please complete and return a "leave of absence form" to the school Office at least one month before leave is required.

For **Hospital/medical appointments** 'Leave of Absence' application forms are not needed. **Please send an email into the school with evidence of your child's appointment**. Where possible please make appointments outside of school hours.

Medical

All medicines, including Asthma inhalers, must be supplied in the original packaging with the dispensing label.

Bikes & Scooters

A Polite reminder - children should not ride bikes or scooters whilst on the school site.

Drinks & Snacks

We do encourage parents/carers to provide their child with a bottle of water; squash is NOT permitted. Water bottles should be "see-through" with a sports top (to avoid spillages) and labelled clearly with your child's name. As a "healthy" school, we encourage parents/carers to provide their child with a healthy snack. Key Stage 1 children are provided with fruit from School as per the government initiative.

Please ensure that your child has a relevant healthy snack at break-time that is nut, sesame seed and kiwi free.

Uniform

Please note that in line with school policy, children are not permitted to wear make-up, have extreme haircuts, or wear earrings whilst at school. If your child is seen wearing earrings, they will be asked to remove them and they will be put in an envelope until home time.

Late Items

Late Items If your child forgets items needed for the school day, they can be dropped off via the office, but we ask that this is kept to a minimum. If a child forgets their water bottle, we have cups in school that can be filled. If there are any letters to be handed in, we ask that your child gives them to their teacher. We appreciate your support with this.


Parking

Reception



The Summer Term is finally here, and we are starting to get warmer weather. This means that we have spent a lot more time outside.

This term we introduced caterpillars into our classes to watch them turn into a chrysalis and turn into butterflies (hopefully that has happened by the time you are reading this letter).

During our playtime we have gone onto the field. This is exciting because we can run around and roll down the hill!

In phonics we are not learning any new sounds, which means we have had lots of time to revise old sounds and we have learnt to read a whole lot of new words. We have been practising using our phonics to write words and even short sentences!

Maths this term has been all about counting forwards and backwards to 20, one more/one less to 20, doubling, halving, and finishing this half term off with odd and even numbers. We have been able to practise these concepts outside with a variety of games.

We are looking forward to the next half of the summer term, with lots of fun games and activities planned.

English – We have been reading *Toys in Space* by Mini Grey. The children have enjoyed making predictions, using adjectives to describe the toys, and completing speech and think bubbles using thoughts and feelings of the characters.

We have had a big focus on phonics and alien words – we will be carrying out the Phonics Screening Check from 12th June so please continue to work on the practice booklets at home. Longer 'real' words (such as concrete and trapeze) can also be a challenge. The children know that they need to sound out to blend and 'chunk it up' if the word is long. Thank you for all the support you have been giving your child with this.

Maths – We have been learning about position & direction, multiplication & division and money. It is great to use practical activities to support these areas at home, e.g., making 'arrays' using pasta, cereal or fruit and writing a number sentence to go with this.

Science – We have enjoyed planting seeds and studying different plants in the school environment. All children have planted a seed to observe over half term. Please update ClassDojo to show how the seeds grow, you could also ask 'what does a seed need to make it grow?'.

History – Year 1 enjoyed a visit by Classroom Adventures last Thursday. Every child thoroughly enjoyed the day and it covered much more than just a history of toys. They learnt about forces (push, pull, twist and gravity) and had the opportunity to use tools such as hammers and sanding blocks. Stephen praised the children for their excellent listening skills – it is always lovely to hear positive praise from visitors to our school about the behaviour and attitudes of TDS children!

We hope you have a restful half term break and look forward to seeing everyone back on Tuesday 6th June as Monday is an INSET day.

From the Year 1 Team

In Year 2 this half term we have been working hard prepping for our SATs. Our learners have been working well and very diligently in order to give it their best shot.

In English we have been further exploring expanded noun phrases while looking at how to write in different tenses and the use of various suffixes.

In mathematics we have been learning about time, directionality and orienteering, fractions, measurement, problem solving. We have been recapping our knowledge on how to add, subtract, multiply and divide. In order to best support your child solidifying these concepts please let them assist you when cooking or baking, letting them help you tell the time and letting them oversee the map when you go for a walk.

In science this half term we have been looking at seeds and plants and the different stages seeds go through to grow into the beautiful trees and flowers. We have been able to see these sprouting with the lovely weather and on our walks around the field. We have been exploring the different parts of a seed and how they germinate and survive underground before they begin to sprout and rely on the sun for food.

In celebration of the coronation of King Charles the Third, in history we have been looking at monarchs, who they are and how did the monarchy begin. We have been looking at figures of historical significance, namely William the Conqueror and the Battle of Hastings. We have explored this historical event by recreating the Bayeux Tapestry.


Homework for the remainder of the term - to best prepare our learners for Year 3 we will be focusing on timetable Rockstars and spelling homework. Please ensure that you are reading with your child every evening and we encourage you to make use of the public library, books at home and school readers.

Year 3 have been studying plants during their science lessons this term. They have explored our grounds and looked at and drawn detailed sketches of our amazing flowering plants.

In maths we have studied fractions. We had great fun making play dough pizzas which we then cut up into fractions. If you are cutting up food at home maybe you could ask your child what fractions you have cut things into. Pizza and cake make our favourite fractions!





On Tuesday 25th April we were lucky enough to take part in some sessions run by LEAP. We discussed what compassion is and we enjoyed acting out acts of compassion in our groups.

Dear Parents/Carers

Year 4 are busier than ever at the moment! We've been learning the songs for the Coronation event that many of you attended, and at the same time learning the moves and words for our Viking assembly.





In maths, we are learning about positions on a grid, and describing polygons and angles. We've also been refreshing the topics we did earlier this year as we will have assessments after half term.

When we come back, Year 4 will take the statutory multiplication check, so we've been brushing up on this important skill and appreciate you practicing at home. Once the results are published, we will send you your child's scores.

In science, we have been learning about sound and pitch, and of course we've covered the Vikings in history.

In 4D we've had a few weeks swimming now, and the children are getting used to changing quickly to make the most of our swimming time.

We have a lot of really good swimmers, and the rest are learning fast.




Year 5 Assembly Prep:

Maths:


This week we have been looking at angles in triangles and polygons. Year 6 had great fun creating a set of angles using masking tape and measuring them using a protractor.





English:

We have been writing texts inspired by our current book - MANFISH— the story of Jacques Cousteau. The children started off making some great predictions and having discussions. We continue to write and edit diary entries and biographies in lessons.





Science:

In science, we have started our unit on Evolution. We have looked at inheritance and adaptation in the past week. Next term, we will explore the work of Charles Darwin.

Uniform changes at a glance

We have considered carefully a way to smarten the image of our pupils at TDS. We have done this in a way that we hope will be the least expensive to parents. The major changes are outlined below but please do read the full policy paying particular attention to **appendix 2** where you will find the full breakdown of uniform.

If you would like to comment on the changes please email office@thedownleyschool.co.uk by Friday 9th June. We will inform you of the outcome of this consultation in the following week. This means that you will have plenty of time to ensure your children are dressed in the correct uniform, if any changes go ahead, from September 2023.

- We will have one uniform that continues throughout the entire year with the option of wearing a yellow checked summer dress/play suit in the summer term
- School uniform
 White polo shirt (Rec to Y2)
 White shirt and tie (Y3-6)
- Tailored (not pocket combat style) shorts can be worn throughout the year if pupil's wish (boys grey, girls blue)
- PE kit yellow polo shirt, navy joggers and hoody/tracksuit (no markings)
- Reception pupils navy joggers every day (no trousers or skirts)









Uniform Policy

<u>Aims</u>

A high standard of personal appearance is expected of, and from, all pupils. Through our uniform policy and dress codes we aim to:

- encourage pride in the school;
- encourage a sense of equality and cohesion;
- protect pupils from social pressures to dress in a particular way;
- support teaching and learning children are encouraged to dress smart to help them think smart;
- provide a safe and secure environment in which pupils learn how to dress appropriately.

In these ways, the uniform policy supports the overall aims of the school.

Expectations

It is expected that **ALL uniform is named** and that pupils will wear the school uniform each day, with the appropriate footwear. If a pupil:

- does not wear the correct uniform, a verbal reminder of our expectations will be communicated to the child or parents/carers;
- continues to not wear the correct uniform, a written reminder of our expectations will be communicated to the parents/carers (see Appendix 1);
- arrives at school wearing inappropriate clothing which causes concern (e.g. unsuitable for the weather, too revealing, offensive/unsuitable slogans, etc.) then the school may provide uniform for the pupil to wear for the day;

Uniform

- The school prospectus provides parents/carers with full details of the uniform to be worn and this also set out in Appendix 2 for ease of reference
- At the time of writing this policy, most items of uniform can be purchased from <u>Leonard Hudson</u>
 <u>Teamwear</u>. We are currently reviewing our uniform provider and we will notify you of any
 changes.
- Second-hand items are available via the Parent Association
- School cardigans, V-neck jumpers and polo shirts without the school logo may also be purchased from other retailers but must be in keeping with the style sold at <u>Leonard Hudson Teamwear</u>
- PE kit should be worn to school on PE days
- All school items must be clearly labelled with the child's name
- The pupils are responsible for taking care of their own items of uniform
- There is a brown box for lost property located outside the school office. Any unnamed items in good condition left unclaimed will be sold.
- If there is any reason why a pupil cannot wear our uniform or requires special dispensation (e.g. health or religious grounds) then the Headteacher will consider sympathetically any such request from a parent/carer.
- Outdoor clothing, including coats, hats, scarves and wellies must be removed on arrival at school.

Hair

- Hair should be worn away from the face or tied up and back using a scrunchie, hairband, clip or ribbon.
- Hair accessories for all year groups must be plain dark blue or black.
- Unnatural hair colouring is not permitted. The interpretation of 'unnatural' is as follows:
 - o a colour that is not found within the natural hair colour spectrum, i.e. a bright, extreme or vivid colour:
 - o a combination of colours that is easily visible or stark in contrast.
- If hair extensions are worn, no beading is permitted. Extensions must also be in a colour that naturally blends with the hair.
- Hair must be cut in a conventional manner (no markings).

Jewellery, Make Up etc.

- Only small gold/silver stud earrings are permitted.
- Watches are allowed but NO smart watches are to be worn.
- Other body piercings or tattoos / body paintings are not permitted except for mendhi patterns for religious purposes.
- Make-up and nail varnish are not permitted.
- Fingernails must be short and nail extensions of any kind may not be worn.
- Garments covering the face or whole body are not permitted.
- Students who wish to wear hijabs may do so provided that the fabric is plain, lightweight and dark blue or black.

Cost of uniform

We want to ensure that the cost of uniform does not lead to any pupil feeling socially excluded or unable to afford other necessities. Parents who are unable to provide their child with the required items of school uniform should contact the Headteacher. Such approaches will be handled with discretion and sensitivity.

We are in the process of reviewing our uniform supplier to ensure that quality and price are of best value. Parents will be made aware of any changes.

Equality and diversity

The Downley School is an inclusive school. Although some items refer to 'girls' and 'boys', we feel that it is important that parents are free to choose the uniform that allows your child to feel valued, supports their identity within school and their right to choose. This is in keeping with Equality and Diversity policy.

- Navy blue joggers
- Shoes plain black, no coloured markings, black soles, no flashing lights
- Socks Navy or grey ankle/knee length


