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Statutory assessment data

The grids below show the data for Reception, Phonics, Y2 teacher assessment and Y6 SATs.

We are really pleased with the improvement that can be seen in all year groups. Every cohort of children does have unique strengths and challenges, but we feel that the results are an indicator that there are improvements in teaching and learning. As you know we use Little Wandle to teach phonics and this year's results show significant improvements. All results are now either much closer or are in-line with national data — this is definitely something we are proud of, and we will continue to work on improving standards next year.

Special measures monitoring inspection of The Downley School

This letter sets out the findings from the monitoring inspection of your school that took place on 13 and 14 June 2023, on behalf of His Majesty's Chief Inspector of Education, Children's Services and Skills. The monitoring inspection was carried out under section 8(2) of the Education Act 2005 and was the first monitoring inspection since the school was judged to require special measures following the graded (section 5) inspection that took place in March 2022.

During the inspection, I discussed with you and other senior leaders, the chair of the interim executive board (IEB) and the local authority the actions that have been taken to improve the school since the most recent graded inspection. We discussed the ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. I also visited lessons, spoke to a wide range of pupils, looked at pupils' work and observed pupils' behaviour. I scrutinised school documents, talked to staff and took into account the responses to the staff and parent surveys. I have considered all this in coming to my judgement.

The Downley School remains inadequate and requires special measures. Leaders have made progress to improve the school, but more work is necessary for the category of concern to be removed.

The school may appoint early career teachers before the next monitoring inspection. I would recommend that no more than two early career teachers are appointed before the next monitoring visit.



The progress made towards the removal of special measures

Since the previous inspection, there have been significant changes to the leadership and staffing structure of the school. Just under half of the current staff were at the school when it was last inspected. There have been several interim headteachers prior to your appointment at Easter 2023. A number of other leadership appointments have increased the school's capacity to improve. The Department for Education is seeking a multi-academy trust to sponsor the school.

The lack of continuity in leadership and continued turbulence in staffing have meant that the vital improvements needed for the quality of education have not happened as quickly as they should. However, with improved stability in leadership and staffing, you and other leaders are now making some of the essential improvements to the curriculum. Crucially, leaders have focused on improving some critical subjects first.

Leaders have successfully launched a new systematic synthetic phonics scheme. Staff are trained in its implementation. However, further professional development is required to ensure that all staff deliver this precisely and consistently. Leaders have rightly identified the legacy of weaker reading throughout the school. Many pupils read less well than you expected, in part due to the disruption of the pandemic and the turbulence caused by staffing changes at the school. Leaders must ensure that effective support is put into place to help older pupils catch up with reading skills as a matter of urgency.

The early years provision is improving. Leaders have raised the expectations for what children can achieve. Leaders have made a start to improving the curriculum. Some activities are meaningful and purposeful. However, staff do not always make the most of learning opportunities. Sometimes, staff focus on what a child does rather than engaging them in learning. Once the curriculum redesign is complete, leaders need to focus on quality assurance of delivery to ensure that children flourish and are sufficiently well prepared for learning in Year 1.

The provision for pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) has been a focus for leaders. While leaders have benefited from appropriate and purposeful support from the local authority, the provision remains a concern. The recent appointment of a temporary special educational needs and disabilities coordinator (SENDCo) is improving engagement with parents. However, further support and essential training is required for the SENDCo. While staff are aware of pupils' specific needs, teachers are not trained effectively enough in how to adapt the curriculum for these pupils. As a result, pupils with SEND do not achieve as well as they should. Support plans are not precise enough and do not relate to pupils' specific needs. Leaders must continue to focus their efforts on improving the provision for pupils with SEND.

Pupils' achievement, particularly in writing and mathematics, at the end of Year 2 was low in 2022. Similarly, phonics attainment was poor. Leaders are aware that future targets need to be much more aspirational. Improvements in pupils' achievement this year are



evident in pupils' current work. However, leaders have not yet ensured that teachers check pupils' learning of the curriculum effectively enough.

Staff and pupils recognise that behaviour in the school has improved, and relationships between pupils and staff are blossoming. Lessons are calm and purposeful. Pupils play well together in beautiful surroundings. Most pupils feel that unkind comments or hurtful behaviours are very rare at their school. However, there is a small amount of rough play outside of lessons, which leaders are aware of. Most pupils are confident that staff would help to support them to deal with worries or concerns without hesitation. Concerningly, though, a small number of older pupils do not report unwanted or inappropriate comments or physical contact. Leaders must address this by implementing a consistent behaviour management policy.

Leaders have rightly focused on the areas for improvement highlighted by the previous inspection. Leaders and staff are aware of where their energies and efforts need to remain focused, moving forwards. The emerging stability in leadership and staffing is particularly significant. Staff report feeling happier and more positive about the future. Pupils and parents share this optimism. The IEB has been crucial in supporting the school on its improvement journey. The experienced chair and other members of the IEB have diligently and patiently provided appropriate support and robust challenge to the school community. The local authority has commissioned interim staff to fulfil leadership positions, who have also made significant contributions to school improvement. You, as the new interim headteacher, have been pivotal in bringing further stability and vibrancy to the role.

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Trained staff know the signs to look out for to identify potential abuse or neglect. Leaders of safeguarding are persistent and diligent in following up concerns for the most vulnerable pupils. There are minor improvements needed to sharpen processes further. For example, the recording and subsequent follow-up actions relating to incidents of physical restraint need to be tighter.

I am copying this letter to the chair of the IEB, the Department for Education's regional director and the director of children's services for Buckinghamshire. This letter will be published on the Ofsted reports website.


Student Leadership Team

As you may know we have a student leadership team consisting of five Y6 pupils. I have had several meetings with them since starting in April and so far, the boys have implemented one of their suggestions of introducing an educational Minecraft club for Y6 children. The girls also wanted to host an assembly that showcased some of the talent in the school and so today they hosted the values assembly which this month focuses on confidence.

Another request they had was to be headteacher for the day and so on **Wednesday 19**th **July** they will be undertaking some leadership duties. On this day, you may see the student leadership team dressed in **smart** mufti unlocking the gates and greeting the children and parents on their arrival to school, repeating a similar activity at the end of the day. They will spend a large part of their day recruiting Year 5 children to be the next student leaders. They have already started this process by compiling a letter that invited them to apply for the post and have thought of their questions that they will ask the short-listed candidates on the day. They will also be involved in purchasing badges for this role and making payment for these and shadowing any other activities that I undertake for the day.

I very much look forward to spending the day with our potential future leaders and will announce next year's student leadership team before the end of the term. The student leadership team will be responsible for recruiting our school council members who will assist in representing the views of the children.

Requests for Leave of Absence during term time:

Parents/carers are advised that requests for **holiday** during term time will **not** be authorized. All requests must be submitted in advance to the school office on the correct forms. Supporting evidence of requirement for leave should be stapled to application. If the form is not completed or the application is marked as unauthorised this will be entered onto the school records. It is important that your children attend school every day they are well enough to do so and on time as this impacts on their learning. We expect all children to reach 96% attendance.

Important changes for 2023/24

Mobile phones


Children in Year 5 and Year 6 are allowed to bring in mobile phones to school if they are travelling home by themselves. Year 6 can continue to bring their phone into school as they have been this year, but we are making a change that will start with our next year 5 cohort.

In an attempt to delay the onset of involvement with social media the school will **no longer be allowing Year 5 pupils to bring smart phones** to school (this will continue into year 6 for this cohort of children). We see the detrimental impact social media has on some of our children's mental health from Year 5 and believe that some of this can be attributed to the introduction of mobile phones. Our preference would be that children do not have access to a mobile phone until secondary school, but we understand that some parents wish their children to have one when they start walking home by themselves in Year 5. If you wish your child to have a mobile phone as a means of contact between you and them, we ask that you invest in a non-smart phone (similar to the old-style Nokia) which can be obtained cheaply from various supermarkets. In this manner children will be less able to engage in virtual social activities, including unlimited messaging and phone calling through Wi-Fi enabled phones.

We hope that by enforcing this rule on our Year 5 children it assists parents in delaying the purchase of a smartphone until children are more mature (like when they transfer to secondary school). Many children have access to tablets at home and there is no need for a child of primary age to have a smart phone alongside this. Children of this age are still learning to navigate the rules of socialising in 'real' life. The fall outs that are caused on apps like WhatsApp are spilling over into school life and also impacting on their well-being and self-esteem. Let's allow our children to be children while at TDS.

Smart watches are also unsuitable for school use and are not allowed in school.







School day times 8:40-3:15

We are aware that the Infant classes need to complete a few extra minutes of learning time to be compliant with DfE guidelines.

From September, we therefore will be adjusting the finish time for Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 to be in line with Y3-6 children. This means that ALL classes will finish at 3:15pm. Gates will be open from 3:10pm.

In the morning gates will continue to open at 8:40am and we strongly encourage children to arrive at this time. Early morning learning activities will be starting from 8:45 so we urge parents to ensure their children arrive promptly at 8:40am.

Water bottles

We request that water bottles are **plastic** and have a **sports top**. Metal bottles are very heavy, hurt when they are dropped on feet and make a loud disturbing noise when they fall off the table.

Contacting school staff

We kindly ask that parents are mindful that teachers are not expected to respond to messages sent outside of the following hours:

8:30-4:30pm (3:30 Friday)

Teachers are also not expected to respond to messages over the weekend. Please bear in mind that teachers are unable to respond to messages while working with your children and we appreciate your patience while waiting for a response. If the matter is urgent, please call the school on: **01494527033**. There is normally someone available to receive calls between **8:30** am and **4:30** pm **(4:00pm Friday)**







School Office

Class Notes

Please can you ensure that emails regarding absence, late arrival or your child leaving School early are sent into the school Office. We will then pass your message onto the teacher. Thank you.

Absences

Reporting an Absence. If your child is absent from School, please ensure you report the absence to the school Office via the absence line every day of your child's absence. **Sickness and diarrhoea** - Your child is not permitted to return to School until they have been free of sickness/diarrhoea for 48 hours from the last episode, as per the Buckinghamshire County Council's policy.

Leave of Absence Applications

'Leave of Absence' application forms need to be completed for **all absences other than medical** if they are during school hours, excluding sickness, which is reported via the absence line. The school does not encourage holiday during term time and therefore will be unauthorised. Where possible, please complete and return a "leave of absence form" to the school Office at least one month before leave is required.

For **Hospital/medical appointments** 'Leave of Absence' application forms are not needed. **Please send an email into the school with evidence of your child's appointment**. Where possible please make appointments outside of school hours.

Medical

All medicines, including Asthma inhalers, must be supplied in the original packaging with the dispensing label.

Bikes & Scooters

A Polite reminder - children should not ride bikes or scooters whilst on the school site.

Drinks & Snacks

We do encourage parents/carers to provide their child with a bottle of water; squash is NOT permitted. Water bottles should be "see-through" with a sports top (to avoid spillages) and labelled clearly with your child's name. As a "healthy" school, we encourage parents/carers to provide their child with a healthy snack. Key Stage 1 children are provided with fruit from School as per the government initiative.

Please ensure that your child has a relevant healthy snack at break-time that is nut, sesame seed and kiwi free.

Uniform

Please note that in line with school policy, children are not permitted to wear make-up, have extreme haircuts, or wear earrings whilst at school. If your child is seen wearing earrings, they will be asked to remove them and they will be put in an envelope until home time.

Late Items

Late Items If your child forgets items needed for the school day, they can be dropped off via the office, but we ask that this is kept to a minimum. If a child forgets their water bottle, we have cups in school that can be filled. If there are any letters to be handed in, we ask that your child gives them to their teacher. We appreciate your support with this.
