Updates



Lunchtime routines

We have made an adjustment to our lunchtime service. Previously ALL children remained in the hall for a 20-minute period regardless of whether they had finished eating. As you can probably appreciate 120 children seated in the hall at one time can get noisy as while they are waiting for others to finish children get bored.

Our new system now allows for children to leave the hall after 10 minutes if they have finished eating and would like to return to the playground. The system seems to be running well and there is a much calmer atmosphere in the dining hall. We are mindful that some children that are keen to get outside to play may not eat as much as they should. We are trying our best to monitor this. To begin with we found it easier to monitor school dinners but now are making checks on packed lunches too. If you are noticing an increase in left over food in packed lunches (and are unhappy with how much your child is eating) please let us know so we can be particularly mindful of your child.

On 20th September everyone in school attended an where assembly we were officially presented with an ODBST plague for our school. Many members of ODBST were present and introduced themselves to the children. In this picture you can see (left to right) Rob Halls (Challenge partner), Jan Marin (Director of Education) and Sulina Piesse (CEO). The plaque is on display at the front of the school.



Assemblies

Every Monday we celebrate our jigsaw theme for the week (see the front page of the newsletter for this half-term themes). These are held as 3 separate assemblies, Y1/2, Y3/4 and Y5/6 so that we can target content at an age- appropriate level. Reception currently have their assembly as a year group in class.

We now hold either a celebration or a key stage assembly every week. These are held on alternate weeks. Moving forward, for Celebration Assembly, we will be selecting 2 children per class every 2 weeks. This way they will always be celebrating with their peers. Parents will continue to be invited to Celebration Assembly in the usual manner. Year groups not attending Celebration Assembly attend either an Infant or Junior assembly which will vary in content according to events in the school year.

Changes to the timetable

We have changed our timetable so that PSHE, music, RE and MFL are now at the start of the day. At 9:30am we will mostly do guided reading or phonics across the school so that children who are new to learning English can benefit from the expert teaching of phonics whilst their peers are reading. We recognise that for some children maths and English are not their favourite subjects so to start the school day with these make the start to the day more accessible to everyone. It also ensures that our brains are fired up ready for learning English and maths skills before lunch time.

We also have adjusted our timetables so that art or DT (dependent on which subject your child's class is doing this half term) have a whole afternoon alternate weeks with computing. As teachers we felt that children require longer periods of time for these subjects to allow greater opportunities for quality work to be produced.

We have started Wake and shake at the start of the school day on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. While many children enjoy this, we recognise that not all children want to participate so the activity is optional. We will monitor engagement with this and seek feedback from the pupils.

New Entry System



As some of you may have seen the school now has a new entry system. This was put in place over the Summer holidays to give us an added layer of security to the building. The intercom button can be found on the left-hand side of the entrance door as indicated by the sign. Please press this and one of the admin staff will welcome you in. On exiting you are also required to press the exit button, placed on the wall by the front windows. Children must NOT help the office by letting people into school.



Values

You may have noticed the value is missing from the front page of the newsletter. We are in the process of reviewing our values. There are currently 22 values which we believe is too many. We are looking to agree on 6 values that we can focus on throughout the year, one per half term. These will be closely linked to our jigsaw curriculum to ensure that key messages can be clearly understood by all. School CENSUS day is on Thursday 5th October. Our funding for next year is determined by the number of children that are in school on Thursday 5th October and also by the number of infant children (R, Y1, Y2) that have a school meal.

We are striving for ALL children to attend school on Thursday 5th October, assuming they are well enough to do so, as our funding for this year was impacted by poor attendance on Census day last year. Junior children can order meals as normal, but all Infant children will be offered a school meal (separate communication will follow regarding this).

Announcements



Is your child well enough to be in school?

As we enter into Autumn and viruses start spreading, we continue to support NHS guidance and would prefer your child to be in school with a minor cough or common cold. If they have a fever (38C or more), keep them off school until the fever goes. We will encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

If your child has mild COVID-19 symptoms, such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, and feels well enough, they can come to school. However, if these symptoms are coupled with a high temperature (38C and above) or they do not feel well enough to go to school or do their normal activities they should remain at home. There is no requirement to test children for COVID-19.

There is no obligation for staff to test for COVID-19. To prevent the spread of **any** viruses around the school, staff that are unwell (but well enough to be in school) will be wearing masks when entering public areas of the school.

Water bottles

A few parents have requested that their child continues to use a metal water bottle. We request that if these are used a protective sleeve be used to help soften the fall when they are knocked over and drop on the floor. Similarly, a sports top lid assists with minimising any spillages in the eventuality of it being knocked over. Metal bottles not conforming to this will not be allowed to remain at the desk. Children will be encouraged to drink water at times that does not disturb the flow of lessons and learning of others.

School uniform

Thank you to all those parents that have adhered to the uniform policy. We have seen a few items of BLACK clothing and would like to remind parents that NAVY tops are on the uniform list.

Also, a reminder that children are to wear plain black footwear when in their school uniform. Trainers with colour on are for PE use only.

School Office

Class Notes

Please can you ensure that emails regarding absence, late arrival or your child leaving School early are sent into the school Office. We will then pass your message onto the teacher. Thank you.

Absences

Reporting an Absence. If your child is absent from School, please ensure you report the absence to the school Office via the absence line every day of your child's absence. **Sickness and diarrhoea** - Your child is not permitted to return to School until they have been free of sickness/diarrhoea for 48 hours from the last episode, as per the Buckinghamshire County Council's policy.

Leave of Absence Applications

'Leave of Absence' application forms need to be completed for **all absences other than medical** if they are during school hours, excluding sickness, which is reported via the absence line. The school does not encourage holiday during term time and therefore will be unauthorised. Where possible, please complete and return a "leave of absence form" to the school Office at least one month before leave is required.

For **Hospital/medical appointments** 'Leave of Absence' application forms are not needed. **Please send an email into the school with evidence of your child's appointment**. Where possible please make appointments outside of school hours.

Medical

All medicines, including Asthma inhalers, must be supplied in the original packaging with the dispensing label.

Bikes & Scooters

A Polite reminder - children should not ride bikes or scooters whilst on the school site.

Drinks & Snacks

We do encourage parents/carers to provide their child with a bottle of water; squash is NOT permitted. Water bottles should be "see-through" with a sports top (to avoid spillages) and labelled clearly with your child's name. As a "healthy" school, we encourage parents/carers to provide their child with a healthy snack. Key Stage 1 children are provided with fruit from School as per the government initiative.

Please ensure that your child has a relevant healthy snack at break-time that is nut, sesame seed and kiwi free.

Uniform

Please note that in line with school policy, children are not permitted to wear make-up, have extreme haircuts, or wear earrings whilst at school. If your child is wearing earrings it should only be studs.

Late Items

Late Items If your child forgets items needed for the school day, they can be dropped off via the office, but we ask that this is kept to a minimum. If a child forgets their water bottle, we have cups in school that can be filled. If there are any letters to be handed in, we ask that your child gives them to their teacher. We appreciate your support with this.

Early Years News

The children have settled into school life exceptionally well! They have been learning the routines of the day and making lots of new friends as we have explored the environment both inside and outside of our classrooms. We have also enjoyed our first few sessions at Forest School- learning about the woodland and finding fairies as well as going on a bear hunt!







Our daily phonics and math sessions have been going well, the children have been engaged and have demonstrated some of their learning through our continuous provision activities. We will continue to let you know which sounds and numbers have been our focus and how you can support your children through our weekly Dojo newsletter.







Stars of the week! We will be celebrating 6 stars each week in our own reception classes until half term- after that we will join the rest of the school in the assembly hall to celebrate 1 star from each class- Once we join the whole school If your child is chosen you will be invited in to celebrate with them!

We have had a great start in Year One. The children have had a positive approach to the curriculum and are adjusting well to the challenges Year One presents.



In English, we are reading 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers. The children will focus on this text for their reading and writing this half term and will gain a deep understanding of the story, which will support their writing skills.

In maths, we have reinforced number skills within 10, including how to compare numbers using 'hungry crocodiles' (< > =) – please ask your child to demonstrate!

In our science lessons we are exploring seasonal change and materials. The children have found out about the features of autumn and will be learning about materials and their properties over the coming weeks.



For our work in geography, we have been exploring aerial maps and creating our own 'messy maps' of our classrooms. Please try to use Google Earth to locate your own house and look at the features around your local area.

We are enjoying learning about pulse and rhythm in our music lessons! We have been singing, clapping the pulse, using body percussion, dancing and playing non-tuned instruments to tap the rhythm and pulse of well-known rhymes and songs.

We have reviewed all the graphemes covered in Reception and next week will be starting to introduce alternative graphemes, e.g., 'ay' for the 'ai' sound.


Thank you for all your support at the start of the year – we hope you are enjoying using ClassDojo to see what we are up to in our classrooms.

The Year 2's have had a fun and busy start to the year. We have been busy getting to know each other through fun get to know me games and belonging games.

Academically, we have also been getting to know our learners and have been consolidating knowledge and content covered in Year 1.

In mathematics we have been securing our numbers to 100 and our knowledge on place value concerning 10's and 1's. We have been covering and refreshing our knowledge on different parts of speech during English and how they can impact on our writing. We have also started our book, The Incredible Book Eating Boy, where we have been using the text to answer questions and extend our comprehension knowledge. In addition to this, we have been reviewing some phonics from year 1 while introducing our learners to new sounds and how to blend them. In history we have been covering how schools are different in the past which has opened the classroom to a variety of interesting discussions regarding how schools have changed over time and schools in both Canada and South Africa. In science thus far we have been discussing animals including humans and what they need to survive. This has led us to talk about the importance and benefits of a healthy and balanced diet. In computing we have spoken about the significance of internet safety and why it is imperative to be safe on the internet, in addition to who we can speak to if we feel unsafe online. We have also been practicing how to log on and off our computers and getting familiar with how to operate a laptop. During art we have creatively described and plotted our journeys to school, and it was so interesting to see the different ways we all make our ways to school. In RE we have been exploring how different people give thanks and the various ways we can show thanks.


We have also been lucky to be able to have the Year 6's come and visit the Year 2's. We chose some books and took turns reading to the Year 6's and them reading to us. It was







Year 3 have been enjoying studying rocks and fossils this half term. We have made our own "rocks" in science, we have been reading Stone Age Boy and we have been learning about rocks and fossils in guided reading.



The children have been very engaged in their new Jigsaw lessons – especially the "calm me" and "getting to know me" games with Jigsaw Jino.
They also enjoy having the opportunity to nominate classmates for showing the weekly values.

In computing we have been looking at networks and how messages are sent around the school. This involved us going on a tour to investigate our school network and playing some outdoor games to show how packets of data are transported around the network.




Year 4 have settled in well and are enjoying all our new topics across the curriculum. In maths, we have been exploring place value up to 10,000 and will be moving on to rounding to 10/100/100 next week. Please continue to support your children with learning their times tables as it makes their learning much easier in class when covering various topics.

In English, we have been developing our descriptive writing on volcanoes and dinosaurs inspired by the story of a pebble and will be moving on to a new book 'The Wild Robot' which explores themes of friendship, family, nature vs. technology, bullying and helping others. This links in with our PSHE themes of 'Being in my World' this term.













The children have enjoyed learning about The Romans and our recent digestive system experiment which got quite messy, and we will be looking at teeth next!





A warm welcome from the new Year 5 team — Mrs Murrill, Mrs McGann, Mr Dollemore, Miss Gordon and Mrs Biggs. We've had a great start to the year and have been impressed with the maturity and positive attitude the children have shown so far. We have a lot to look forward to this year.

Maths

The children have been consolidating their learning of place value from year 4 and extending their knowledge of number up to 1,000,000.

We are incredibly pleased that the children have entered year 5 with a secure times table recall, this will make future year 5 topics much easier for the children to understand. We will continue to set 15 minutes of TTRS a week, as we know that regular retrieval will keep the times tables secure.





English

We are looking at two beautiful books: 'The Lost Happy Endings' and Neil Garman's dark version of 'Hansel and Gretel'. Both these books are giving the children opportunities to develop their vocabulary, explore figurative language and apply this to descriptive writing. When you are listening to your child read this week, ask them to consider the impact of the author's choice of language. Why are they choosing certain words over others?

Jigsaw

The children are really enjoying our Jigsaw lessons. Last week, we looked at the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and discussed our responsibilities to these rights. Year 5 is one of the school years where we start to see the children's sense of responsibility and independence grow . Children can walk home alone, mobile phones start to appear, Bikeability gives road independence and for some children, Ufton Court will be their first time away from their family. For a world perspective, talk to your children about how these rights and responsibilities might look different in different parts of the world and why.

In other news...

We were incredibly impressed with the children's letters to be on the school council; they showed us how proud the children are to be part of The Downley School and their passion to be part of its continual improvement. Our representatives from Year 5 are Jesse Jutla and Sanuli Devamullage. Well done to both these children!

Remember to keep an eye on dojo class story to see what the children have been up to in and out of the classroom each week...

Year 6 have had a fantastic start to the year! They have come back from the summer holiday ready to take on their last (but best) year of primary school.

We hit the ground running with our first topic of World War 2. We have learnt about the Battle of Britain and imagined what questions we might ask to a RAF fighter pilot and used drama to answer. We created artwork about the Blitz using silhouettes and paint. We have also been reading and writing about what it would be like as a child in World War 2 from our class book 'Letters from the Lighthouse'.

In Science we have been learning about the human body. We have learnt about the structure of the heart and conducted an experiment to show the different blood vessels in our bodies.

In maths we have been looking at the unit of place value which is fundamental to all of the other units we will learn throughout the year.
