

The Downley School Pupil Premium Projected Report 2017-18

At The Downley School, we have the highest expectations for all our children, ensuring that each child reaches their full potential, both academically and socially.

In order to do this we engage in a range of strategies to issue challenge at an appropriate level, and provide support to overcome barriers to learning. We provide a rich and varied curriculum, which makes an exceptional contribution to pupils' outcomes, and with individualised learning so that children are engaged and achieve exceptionally well now, and at the next stage of their education and in adult life. We also provide practical and timely support when needed

The Government initiated Pupil Premium funding, to help schools to support vulnerable pupils at risk of under achievement. The amount we receive is based on the number of pupils eligible for Free School Meals and those pupils adopted from care.

In the financial year 2017-18 the school is projected to receive a total of £36,060 to support 21 pupils entitled to Pupil Premium Funding. This year we aim to put a higher emphasis on boosting pupil achievement with the appointment and delegation of staff to work alongside class teachers to support the learning of individual pupils. We have also invested in new individualised ICT programmes that can be used at home and school to improve pupil performance in reading and spelling.
